# ZIMBABWE LOOKING TO STRETCH LEAD

**OUTSIDERS** Zimbabwe sit proudly at the top of the NatWest Series points table after an exhilarating opening round of matches. Andy Flower's team romped to a six-wicket victory over the West Indies at Bristol on Thursday, and underlined their credentials as potential series winners with a fine five-wicket triumph over England at The Oval on Saturday.

And the Zimbabweans will have been cheering as umpires Ray Julian and Ken Palmer abandoned play after heavy rain in England's clash with the West Indies at Lord's.

With the hosts reeling on 158 for eight - and with Jimmy Adams' batsmen itching to get to the crease - the West Indies would have fancied their chances of securing a two-point haul.

But they had to settle for just a single point,

leaving the Africans with a three-point lead at the top of the NatWest Series table. Now Zimbabwe will face a fired-up Windies side in the clash at Canterbury.

And Andy Flower will be desperate to avoid a repeat Zimbabwe's visit to Kent for a tour match in early May.

On that occasion, the tourists plunged to an innings and 163-runs defeat against Kent. Flower's side were shot out for just 159 and 165, and the bowlers allowed the county side to rack up 487 with Rahul Dravid amassing 182.

Windies' skipper Adams will be hoping Wavell Hinds and Brian Lara repeat their run-scoring form of the first meeting with Zimbabwe.

Hinds hit 51, and Lara led the way with 60, although the total of 232 was not enough to prevent Zimbabwe kicking off the NatWest Series with a rousing win.

Now Zimbabwe will hope to make it three wins on the trot, putting the pressure on England ahead of their crunch meeting at Old Trafford on Thursday.

## 9th July at Lord's No Result

ENGLAND opened their account in the NatWest Trophy series at Lord's - but only after heavy rain prevented the West Indies from exploiting another below-par batting display.

Looking to bounce back from the five-wicket loss to Zimbabwe at The Oval and record their first points of the tournament, England instead slipped into trouble on 158 for five off 43.5 overs.

At that stage, with the West Indies powerful batting line-up poised, their chances of victory looked slim but for once the weather came to their aid and they were unable to return before umpires Ray Julian and Ken Palmer abandoned play for the day.

Put into bat in helpful overhead conditions, England quickly slipped into trouble with stand-in captain Alec Stewart edging Nixon McLean to second slip in the seventh over of their reply.

But unlike the previous match, when Graeme Hick was able to forge a productive stand with Marcus Trescothick, few of the England batsman were able to display the determination and application required.

Hick perished attempting to drive McLean and got an inside edge behind to wicketkeeper Ridley Jacobs and Matthew Maynard was bowled by emerging fast bowler Corey Collymore attempting to shoulder arms to a delivery which seamed back in and clipped his off-stump.

Somerset left-hander Trescothick fell at the halfway stage, getting a leading edge as he attempted to clip off his legs for the single to bring up his second successive half-century, and giving part-time off-spinner Chris Gayle a simple return catch.

Franklyn Rose then claimed two crucial wickets by having Craig White caught behind before ending Graham Thorpe's promising innings for 42.

At 148 for six with only nine overs remaining, England's hopes of setting a challenging total looked doomed with Gayle bowling Mark Ealham with a straight delivery to finish with two for 28 from his 10 overs before Rose had Andrew Caddick caught at square leg.

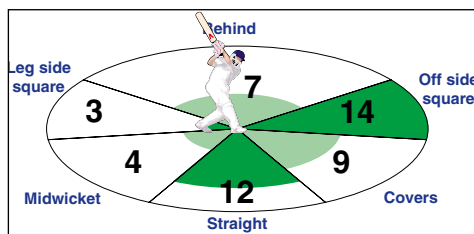

## Key Player

### Marcus Trescothick

# West Indies v Zimbabwe

## Player to watch

**Nixon McLean**  
**Profile:** Experienced in English conditions after two successful seasons as Hampshire's overseas player, the West Indies paceman will be looking to carry on from where he left off at Lord's where his impressively hostile opening burst had England on the back foot from the start. He dismissed key batsmen Alec Stewart and Graeme Hick cheaply and his eight overs cost only 25 runs. With Curtly Ambrose rested and Courtney Walsh troubled by a foot injury, a lot rests on the shoulders of McLean who has a score to settle with Zimbabwe after finishing wicketless from nine overs in West Indies' first game of the series - the six-wicket defeat against Zimbabwe at Bristol.

## The Pitch

The Canterbury groundstaff are certain to produce a track which will offer maximum entertainment for the fans when Zimbabwe take on the West Indies in the NatWest Series. The bowlers should not expect too much assistance from the surface, but it will not be a batsman's paradise either, as any one-day competition should be a fair contest between bat and ball.

## 11th July at Canterbury

THE West Indies will be on a revenge mission when they take on Zimbabwe at Canterbury in the fourth clash of the exciting NatWest Series.

Jimmy Adams' men came off second best when they lost by six wickets to Zimbabwe in the opening match of the series - a floodlit day-night clash at Bristol.

But Zimbabwe will be keen to maintain their 100 per cent start after an equally impressive five-wicket win against England at The Oval on Saturday.

Brian Lara and Wavell Hinds both scored entertaining half-centuries for the Windies in the Bristol clash, but the West Indies were unable to defend their 232 for seven with Zimbabwe opener Neil Johnson leading the victory charge with a superb unbeaten 95.

Minus Curtly Ambrose and Courtney Walsh, the West

Indies' attack lacked its usual cutting edge and Andy Flower's men cantered home with five overs to spare.

At The Oval, Alistair Campbell's 80 spearheaded the success against England, who failed to come to terms with the slow bowling of Paul Strang, Dirk Viljoen and Grant Flower.

The West Indies will be looking to build on their improved performance against England at Lord's on Sunday where impressive pace bowling by Nixon McLean, followed by a sharp burst from Franklyn Rose, reduced the host nation to 158 for eight, before heavy rain forced the abandonment of the game.

The Windies' batsmen will be desperate to get back into action against Zimbabwe, with skipper Jimmy Adams bidding to lead his country to victory - which would slash Zimbabwe's three-point NatWest Series lead to a point.

## Player to watch

**Grant Flower**  
**Profile:** Brother of Zimbabwe captain Andy, the experienced all-rounder had a successful day in the five-wicket win against England at The Oval, taking three cheap wickets from three overs to polish off the tail and then guiding Zimbabwe safely to their victory target of 208. He hit an entertaining 33 not out after coming in at the fall of his side's fourth wicket with the total on 158. This followed on from his good form in the opening NatWest Series victory against West Indies at Bristol when he took two for 27 from six overs and scored an unflustered 26 not out after again coming in at the pivotal number six position.

## NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS

- All matches will consist of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.
- Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.
- In matches without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.
- Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.
- At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.
- Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each innings.
- Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes.
- The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled.
- At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fieldsmen on the leg side.
- For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.
- No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.
- A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.
- Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.
- If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.
- The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

## THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team B's target.
