WINDIES KEEN TO TAKE FINAL CHANCE

The Riverside stages its second NatWest Series match in two days after a 15,000-strong full house enjoyed some scintillating cricket in the first. Marcus Trescothick and Alec Stewart led England to a brilliant 10-wicket win over the West Indies, but the men from the Caribbean will return after a night's sleep keen to bounce back against Zimbabwe. Andy Flower's sharp African outfit have already secured a place in the final and beaten the Windies twice in the series at Bristol and Canterbury, but their fellow tourists will be desperate to join them at Lord's next weekend. Yet if they are to do this, they will be well aware that they cannot afford any more slip-ups. Their solitary point from the

abandoned match with England at Lord's last weekend has left them with it all to do and Zimbabwe will be in no mood to let their recent grip over Jimmy Adams' side slip. Flower's men still sit handsomely at the top of the table but will want to get their foot back on the gas ahead of the final following their loss to England at Old Trafford on Thursday. Their Riverside outing is their penultimate group match in the NatWest Series. They next take on England under the lights at Edgbaston on Tuesday. England and the West Indies then complete the league fixtures at Trent Bridge on Thursday as the Series continues to take top-class one-day cricket around the country.

Already it has seen some electrifying performances from Brian Lara, Neil Johnson, Alistair Campbell and Guy Whittall, as well as those from Stewart and Trescothick, and there looks to be plenty more exciting cricket in store before the Lord's final next Saturday.

On Marcus Trescothick: "This fellow has come in, and, from the first ball against Zimbabwe at The Oval last week, he's looked an international class player. If he can carry that on in this one-day series, I'm sure the selectors will find it very very difficult not to select him for the Old Trafford Test. Marcus has done himself favours in his four innings so far. He's shaped up very well and he's succeeded. As for the Test match arena - if and when he gets in there - I'm sure he'll cope. He's got a pretty simple technique. He plays straight and what impressed me is that he hits it up and down the wicket. Key Man

The stand-in skipper followed up his world-record equalling six catches against Zimbabwe at Old Trafford by returning to his best with the bat. The Surrey veteran's unbeaten 74 was yet another demonstration of the world-class ability that has served England so well over the last decade.

15th July at Chester-le-Street England beat West Indies by 10 wickets

ALEC STEWART and Marcus Trescothick turned on the style as England secured a record-breaking win over West Indies at The Riverside. The pair raced past the West Indies' 169 in just 35.2 overs as England recorded their first 10-wicket victory in 314 limited overs matches.

Having already overcome the previously unbeaten Zimbabwe at Old Trafford on Thursday, England arrived in confident mood and, cheered on by a cold but enthusiastic sell-out north-east crowd, produced a magnificent display in the field.

But England's success in limiting West Indies to such a manageable total revolved around their dismissal of Brian Lara in the 33rd over - just as he was setting himself to propel the tourists towards a far more challenging score.

Having progressed to an increasingly stylish half-century off 91 deliveries, Lara attempted to force the pace and mis-timed a pull shot off Mark Ealham and the leading edge fell safely into the

big hands of Andy Flintoff.

The West Indies innings began badly with opener Wavell Hinds falling leg before to Darren Gough in the second over before Sherwin Campbell and captain Jimmy Adams both fell in the space of three Alan Mullally deliveries.

Lara helped stabilise the innings but his dismissal for 54 spurred on England. Mullally finished as the pick of the bowlers with three for 27. Trescothick and Stewart then tucked into the West Indies attack as they chased their target with relish.

Stewart, with only one half-century in his previous 25 innings, survived an early scare when he was caught off a Reon King no-ball but made the tourists pay with a brilliant unbeaten 74.

Trescothick's 87 not out took his run tally to 244 from four innings and saw him take over Alistair Campbell's 184 as leading scorer in the tournament.

Jimmy Adams
"It's beginning to look as though, as a team, we haven't come to grips with this tournament. Whether it is down to the conditions is debatable but the fact of the matter is that as a team we have not got stuck into this tournament in any way whatsoever. I don't think it is because of what happened in the Lord's Test. There are reasons, but I wouldn't blame that defeat on the way our cricket looks at the moment. We still have two one-day games to focus on before the switch over to the Tests and I still believe we can win two games. I don't think it was a 160-170 wicket. I thought we were 40 or 50 runs short of a competitive total on that surface. I don't think any of us in that dressing room is happy with what's happened in the last two games - in fact for the entire tournament really."

Key Man

Brian Lara
The great Trinidad left-hander looked to be moving into top gear when he fell to Mark Ealham for a well-made 54. Had he continued in the same mood, England's task in chasing victory would undoubtedly have been a far more difficult proposition.

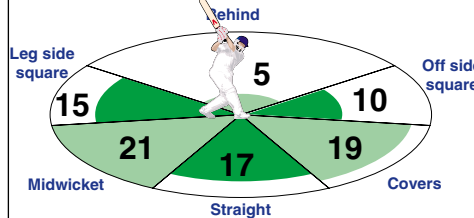

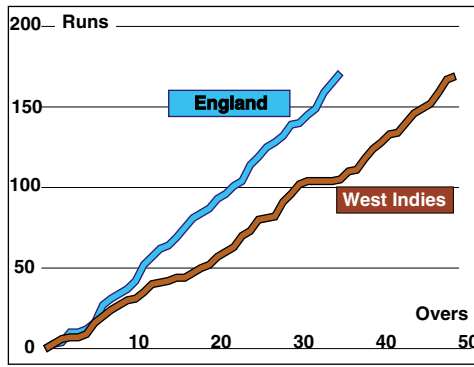
Marcus Trescothick

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NATWEST SERIES – HOW IT WORKS

- All matches will consist of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.
- Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.
- In matches without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.
- Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.
- At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.
- Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each innings.
- Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes.
- The innings of the team batting second shall not commence before the scheduled time unless the team batting first has completed its innings at least 30 minutes prior to the scheduled interval. In such circumstances a 10-minute break will occur, the team batting second will commence its innings and the interval will occur as scheduled.
- At the instant of delivery there may be not more than five fielders on the leg side.
- For the first 15 overs only two fielders are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.
- No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.
- A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.
- Teams will wear coloured clothing and use white balls manufactured by Duke.
- Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.
- If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.
- The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to: The most wins in the group matches. The team that won the most matches between the tied sides. The team with the higher run rate. The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls. In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

THE DUCKWORTH/LEWIS SYSTEM

The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team have 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

- 1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.
- 2) If team B have less resources available than team A, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team B's revised target is obtained by scaling down team A's score by this ratio.
- 3) If team B have more resources available than team A, calculate the amount by which team B's resources exceeds team A's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team A's score to give team B's target.
