Amateurs look to mix it with the best

ith the prospect of a clash with professional opposition on the horizon, the 28 non First-Class teams remaining in the Cheltenham & Gloucester Trophy have plenty to play for in the second round.

Minor Counties champions Dorset are one of 14 teams competing from English cricket's second tier alongside an equal number of county Cricket Board sides.

Dorset take on Bedfordshire at Dean Park in what is sure to be an entertaining affair with the carrot of a home tie against Yorkshire on offer for the winners.

ECB 38 County Cup champions Herefordshire will also be hoping to prove a point as they take on the Gloucestershire Board for the right to play Middlesex.

Of the Board sides, Yorkshire drawing from the undoubted strength of the Bradford and Yorkshire leagues will be hoping to progress at the expense of their Northamptonshire counterparts and Huntingdonshire will be looking to press their claim for Minor County status against Surrey CB.

The Cheltenham & Gloucester Trophy second round will again showcase the talents of many fine players from around the world.

West Indian Phil Simmons will again feature for Wales, South Africa's David Callaghan will take the field for Suffolk and recent New Zealand debutant Andre Adams turns out for Herefordshire.

Shane Warne's Victoria team-mate Jon Moss will be out to impress with Berkshire and the Durham Cricket Board are boosted by the availability of Western Australia's Marcus North.

There will be no shortage of English ability on display either with many familiar faces from the county scene in action alongside some exciting youth prospects.

First Round Review

England old boys still on song

wo former England batsmen proved they are still going strong as the new Cheltenham & Gloucester Trophy swung into life in early May.

Wayne Larkins and Bill Athey may have played in far more illustrious surroundings but they showed they still have plenty to offer as they led the Huntingdonshire Cricket Board and Suffolk into the second round respectively.

Ex-Northamptonshire and Durham opener Larkins, now 47, was in magnificent form as he helped the country's smallest cricketing county to a 77-run win over Oxfordshire at East Challow with a well-made 73

Athey, who enjoyed spells at Yorkshire, Gloucestershire and Sussex during a distinguished career, hit a similarly impressive 71 as Suffolk edged a close encounter with Lincolnshire by four wickets.

Three other Minor Counties also went through after close victories over county Board sides.

Wales needed to call on all their resolve to see off Somerset CB in a game played over two days due to poor weather.

The Welshmen were bowled out for just 159 but produced a superb performance in the field as their opponents fell 20 runs short.

Shropshire squeaked through by just seven runs in a thriller with Devon at Shrewsbury.

Former Somerset and Surrey batsman Gareth Townsend scored 60 as the West Country side responded well to Shropshire's 196. But the home attack, led well by Gareth Byram, who added 1-16 to his earlier half-century, did just enough to prevail.

A fine 73 from West Indian Andrew Jackman put the Nottinghamshire Cricket Board in charge of their tie with Bedfordshire but 93 from David Clark and Oliver Clayson's 56 dashed their hopes.

They are joined in round two by the Derbyshire, Yorkshire and Worcestershire Cricket Boards, who all made comfortable

Derbyshire CB crushed Wiltshire by 49 runs at Chippenham, thanks in the main to 61 from James Bernstead and Ian Parkin's 5-24

The Yorkshire recreational side earned their place with a 77-run thrashing of their trans-Pennine rivals from Lancashire in a disappointingly low-scoring game at

South African Pieter Swanepoel was the pick of an impressive Yorkshire attack with figures of 3-9 as the Red Rose side crashed to 83 all out. John Carruthers, Neil Gill and Stephen Foster chipped in

Jonathan Wright ripped through the Staffordshire order with 5-21 as Worcestershire CB secured a comfortable eight-wicket win at Wolstanton.

The weather washed out the remaining two first round matches, bringing the dreaded bowl-out into play.

Kent CB emerged victorious 3-1 over their Hampshire counterparts after only 10 overs were possible at Maidstone and Middlesex CB managed to see off Northumberland 5-4 in the only action seen in two days at Southgate.
