England look to the future

England may have lost the chance of a second successive NatWest Series triumph but captain Alec Stewart has called on his men to stand firm.

The stand-in skipper, in charge due to Nasser Hussain's injury, has called on his team-mates to bounce back from recording their lowest ever one-day international total against the Aussies.

Immediately after his men slumped to 86 all out to lose by 125 runs, Stewart said his side are still gelling as a limited overs team.

He said: "No-one likes losing and we are certainly not enjoying this losing streak.

"We have to stick in there and try and overcome this dip in form - we haven't played well in this tournament.

"Both Nasser and Duncan (Fletcher) have said that this is a learning curve and we know that - but we still want to break this losing sequence." Stewart also saluted Australian pace duo of Glenn McGrath and Jason Gillespie, who destroyed the England batting line-up.

He added: "I try to deal with fact and not excuses, and the ball certainly moved around after the rain break. But you have to put the ball in the right areas and both McGrath and Gillespie certainly did that." And England have responded to their dismal run by adding a three-week tour of Zimbabwe to their already packed winter schedule.

In addition to tours of India and New Zealand, England will also play five one-dayers against Zimbabwe in early October in an attempt to increase their experience in the shortened version of the game.

They will play three matches in Harare followed by a further two in Bulawayo before returning home for a month and then flying out for their first Test series in India in eight years.

As for Australia and Pakistan, they know they will square up in The NatWest Series final at Lord's next Saturday - and the first of two dress-rehearsals is at Durham's impressive Chester-le-Street ground this weekend.

Steve Waugh's men claimed first blood with their comfortable win at Cardiff, and Waqar Younis will be firing his side up in a bid for revenge.

Australia beat England by 125 runs (D/L Method)

Match Review Scorecard England won the toss

ENGLAND slumped to their lowest total of all time and lost their ninth successive one-day international against Australia in The NatWest Series at Old Trafford to continue their poor run in limited overs cricket.

Chasing an adjusted target of 212 in 44 overs - with rain bringing a premature end to Australia's innings after they had progressed to 208 for seven in 48 overs - England collapsed to 86 all out in only 32.4 overs and slumped to a 125-run defeat.

It was their lowest total in the 329 one-day internationals they have played since the inaugural match in 1971 and eclipsed their previous worst of 93 recorded against Australia at Headingley in the 1975 World Cup semi-final.

It rules them out of the June 23 final of the competition at Lord's, which will now be contested between the world champions and Pakistan, and leaves them battling for pride in their remaining two fixtures over the next week.

England had made an encouraging start to the match with Darren Gough and Andrew Caddick reducing Australia to 27 for three inside the opening nine overs before captain Steve Waugh and Michael Bevan forged a determined 66-run fourth-wicket partnership.

Waugh also teamed up with Damien Martyn to add a further 68 runs for the next wicket before Gough trapped him leg before to draw level with Ian Botham as England's leading one-day international wicket-taker with 145 victims.

Their reply was halted virtually from the start by impressive new ball spells from Glenn McGrath and Jason Gillespie, who reduced them to 40 for five inside the opening 17 overs.

Dominic Cork finished as England's top scorer with just 17 as six players were dismissed for single figure totals including three ducks.

Alec Stewart

"We lost heavily and were never at the races. I'm not going to use excuses. The fact is that they bowled well in helpful conditions and we were not up to it.

"Ben Hollioake's bowling was very good - 10 overs for 30 was very impressive - and he has grown in stature in each game he has played in this series.

"To keep them to 208 at the close of their innings was a good effort.

"But then you get the first four wickets knocked over early in our innings - and you do not recover from that.

"We're always concerned when we lose but with a number of players out, it's a large part of your side and you're always going to struggle against sides like this."

"I don't think he (Stewart) made any tactical errors out there.

"I thought he captained pretty well - but what can you do when your side gets bowled out for 86? He is the captain but he cannot work miracles."

NatWest Man of the Match

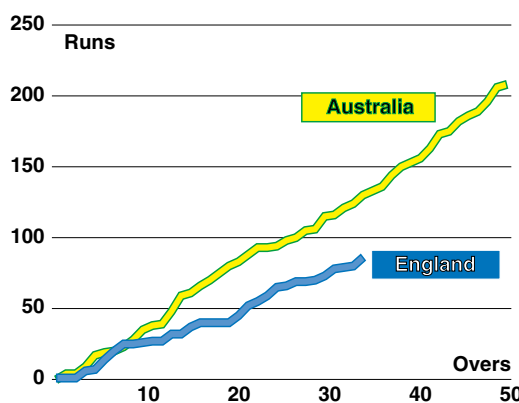
Jason Gillespie

Australia paceman Jason Gillespie ripped the heart out of the England innings with a magnificent display of accurate, lively and hostile fast bowling that the hosts were ill-equipped to combat. Gillespie was playing his first match of the tournament after an early tour hamstring strain - but showed the lay-off had done him no harm as he bowled nine tight overs, featuring five maidens and taking three wickets for just 20 runs. Captain Alec Stewart fell for a duck, Michael Vaughan also trudged off without making a single run and Owais Shah was dismissed for just 10.

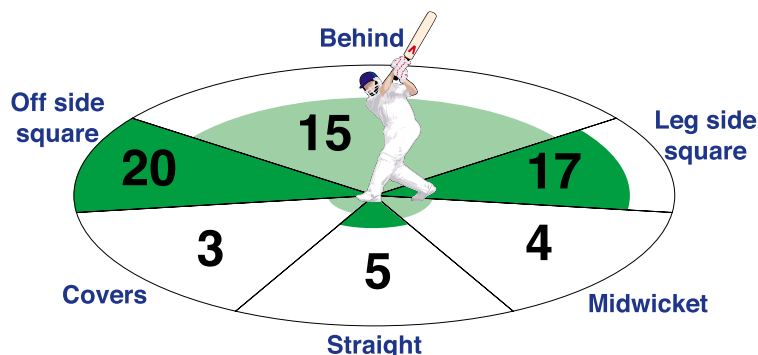

Match Preview	Recent Meetings	Australia Squad	Pakistan Squad
<p>PAKISTAN captain Waqar Younis has asked his side for more of the same when they take on Australia at Chester-le-Street in a practice run for next Saturday's NatWest Series final.</p> <p>England's thrashing at the hands of the Aussies under the lights at Old Trafford on Thursday finally wiped out the hosts' dreams of securing a place in the Lord's showpiece.</p> <p>Now Pakistan and Australia know they will perform at the home of cricket, whatever the results when the sides meet at Durham's Riverside ground and at Trent Bridge on Tuesday.</p> <p>Younis is guarding against complacency, however, and demanding a repeat performance of Tuesday's narrow victory against England, when Pakistan edged home by just two runs.</p> <p>Younis said: "I was very happy with the run-outs and the fielding - it was magic.</p> <p>"Our guys played really well, especially Yousuf Youhana and Younis Khan. We really needed a partnership, and the bowling supported it.</p> <p>"In the last over, Saqlain kept his nerve and got (Marcus) Trescothick's wicket which was the vital one. It was a great catch by Shahid Afridi and it gave us the game." Waqar Younis

Pakistan captain Waqar Younis is one of the most feared bowlers in world cricket and is capable of unnerving even the most composed of one-day batsmen. Against England on Tuesday, Younis' tight spell of 10 overs for 20 runs - including two wickets - proved vital as his side won by just two runs.

Damien Martyn

Australia's Damien Martyn proved his huge worth to his country by making a crucial batting contribution against England at Old Trafford. After early wickets tumbled, captain Steve Waugh and Martyn remained calm. Martyn made an impressive unbeaten 51 before the heavens opened to end the innings two overs early.

How It Works

○ All matches will consist of one innings per side and each innings will be limited to 50 overs. A minimum of 25 overs per team shall constitute a match.

○ Matches shall be of one day's scheduled duration with the exception of the final, for which a reserve day has been allocated in case of weather interruption.

○ In matches without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra official playing time in day matches and up to 30 minutes in floodlit matches to make up for time lost.

○ Play is scheduled to start at 10.45am with an interval of 45 minutes at 2.15pm and close of play at 6.30pm.

○ At floodlit matches play is scheduled to start at 2.30pm with an interval of 45 minutes at 6pm and close of play at 10.15pm.

○ Two drinks intervals, each one hour and 10 minutes apart, are permitted for each innings.

○ Where play is delayed or interrupted the umpires will reduce the length of the interval between innings. If up to 60 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 30 minutes. If between 60 and 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 20 minutes. If more than 120 minutes are lost the interval will be reduced to 10 minutes.

○ In games without a reserve day there is provision for up to 60 minutes of extra playing time for day matches and 30 minutes for floodlit matches.

○ If the innings of the team batting first is completed prior to the scheduled time for the interval, the interval shall take place immediately and the innings of the team batting second will commence correspondingly earlier.

○ For the first 15 overs only two fieldsmen are permitted to be outside the field restriction marking at the instant of delivery. This restriction will be lifted earlier in circumstances where the number of overs is reduced.

○ No bowler shall bowl more than 10 overs in an innings. In a delayed or interrupted match where the overs are reduced no bowler may bowl more than one-fifth of the total overs allowed.

○ A no ball will be called for short-pitched bowling. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.

○ Umpires have been instructed to apply a very strict and consistent interpretation in calling wides. The penalty will be one run plus any runs scored.

○ In line with the ICC Code of Conduct, fines may be imposed for slow over rates.

○ Teams will play each other three times in the group stage and score two points for a win and one point for a tie or no result.

○ If the scores in a match are level the result shall be a tie and no account shall be taken of the number of wickets that have fallen.

○ The top two teams in the group will contest the final. In the event of teams finishing on equal points the right to play in the final will be decided according to:

The most wins in the group matches;

The team that won the most matches between the tied sides;

The team with the higher run rate;

The team that has taken the higher number of wickets per balls;

In the event that teams are still level they will draw lots.

The Duckworth Lewis System

If matches are rain-affected the Duckworth Lewis system is used to reset targets. The system is based on what percentage of its resources (overs and wickets) a team have left. With 50 overs left and 10 wickets remaining, a team has 100 per cent of its resources left. The table shows the percentage of resources at other stages in the innings.

The procedure for working out targets is as follows:

1) For each innings: Use the table to calculate the resource percentage lost by the interruption and therefore calculate the resource percentage still available.

2) If team 2 have less resources available than team 1, calculate the ratio of the resources available to both teams. Team 2's revised target is obtained by scaling down team 1's score by this ratio.

3) If team 2 have more resources available than team 1, calculate the amount by which team 2's resources exceeds team 1's.

Work this out as a percentage of 225 (the average 50-over score in ECB matches and one-day internationals). This gives the extra runs to add to team score to give team 2's target.
