Welcome to Canberra for the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female.

Underage championships for male and female cricketers are becoming more important for the continued development of players and the growth of the game.

The championships provide opportunities for young players to build the skills and experience needed to perform at higher levels. They are the development centres from which we hope to channel our most promising players into senior grade cricket, state honours and Australian team selection.

Twenty-two players from the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female (including the former under-18 competition) have gone on to represent Australia in international cricket.



This list includes two of the most experienced Australian players in senior captain Belinda Clark and vice-captain Karen Rolton, and last year's Australian youth captain Lisa Sthalekar and vice-captain Clea Smith.

Since the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female has existed in its own right (1996-97), New South Wales has claimed all six championship titles.

Last year, New South Wales defeated Victoria by 98 runs to retain the Betty Wilson Shield.

Women's cricket in Australia is growing and the underage competitions continue to demonstrate the strength and popularity of the sport.

The championship is indebted to the support and commitment of the legion of volunteers, friends and family who dedicate many hours to the game.

The Australian Capital Territory Cricket Association should be acknowledged for its contribution in hosting this year's championship.

I wish all teams and officials success in their quest for the coveted championship title.

Strong performances in the 2002-03 Australian Under-19 Championship – Female could lead to Australian selection for the 2003 international series against England.

For the first time, an international under-19 female series will be staged this year between Australia and England.

The series will provide the opportunity for both teams to gain valuable competition at an international level and help prepare the players for possible senior international duties in the future.

The England under-19 team arrives on Australian shores for two one-day international matches against their Australian counterparts at Bowral in New South Wales, on 14 and 15 January.

Ahead of its international matches, the England side will compete in this year's Australian Under-19 Championship – Female in Canberra.

The Australian under-19 team for the international series will be announced at the completion of the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female in Canberra on 9 January.

The 12-player side will be selected by former Test player and Australian Chairperson of Selectors Margaret Jennings, and Australian youth selectors Glenys Thatcher and Shane Souter.

At the conclusion of the championship, both national under-19 teams will travel from Canberra to Bowral.

The 13-player England under-19 squad, announced in November, arrives in Canberra on 1 January before its first match at the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female against Tasmania on 2 January.

**Team selection criteria**

To be eligible for selection in the Australian under-19 team, a player must have competed in the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female and be under 19 years-of-age as at 1 September 2002.

Players selected in the Australian youth team (under-23) are ineligible for the Australian under-19 team unless the selectors deem a player worthy of a leadership opportunity with the Australian under-19 team.

This policy has been introduced to maximise the opportunities for players to compete in international youth cricket matches in 2002-03. Players impacted by this policy will be informed prior to the announcement of the Australian under-19 team.

Lisa Sthalekar is embarking on what should be an extremely rewarding summer. The New South Wales Institute of Sport (NSWIS) Blues star is to play her 50th Women's National Cricket League (WNCL) match, claim her 50th WNCL wicket, close in on 1000 WNCL career runs and, as the list of accolades lengthens, possibly add an Australian Test debut to the mix.

Sthalekar began her cricket career as many players do – in the backyard. Her father's love of the game quickly rubbed off on the emerging youngster as she developed her own passion for the sport and an all-round ability that last season propelled her into both the top five run-scorers and wicket-takers list in the WNCL.

While women's cricket in Australia continues to build a healthy profile and clear pathways for young female cricketers to follow, Sthalekar is one of the first players to progress from the restructured Australian Under-19 Championship – Female to the international level.

"The under-19 championship was a fantastic experience. I was able to make so many friends and was lucky enough to win the tournament each year that I competed," she said.

"The championship showed me the standard I had to play to make it to the next level. It's important that the players make the most of their time at the event, and use the experience to develop their game to become better cricketers.

"As the women's game keeps growing, we should see more players coming through the underage competitions where they really start to develop and hopefully, they'll one day play for the Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars."

Sthalekar, while still just 23 years of age, is considered a seasoned performer for her state team, and a vital cog in the Australian line-up. She took out the Player of the Finals award in the WNCL finals series in February 2002, before captaining the Commonwealth Bank Shooting Stars to victory in three of its four matches against New Zealand. A later that month. The youth captain then joined the Australian senior side to play a strong role in its 5-1 Rose Bowl win against New Zealand in March.

Despite her recent achievements, cricket hasn't always been smooth sailing for Sthalekar. After losing her mother to a long battle with illness last year, Sthalekar has had to overcome a tough period in her life to regain her focus on cricket.

"I've made sure that I make the most of my opportunities and stay open to learning new skills and embracing experiences along the way," she said.

"At the championships, you have to perform consistently every day for a week and that's a tough assignment. The one thing I focussed on in particular, was to be physically and mentally tough for what lay ahead."

"Learning to cope with this expectation and pressure to perform has helped me develop a strong mindset to deal with things today, both on and off the field."

**Commonwealth Bank Shooting Stars (Australian youth team)**

The Australian youth team, the Commonwealth Bank Shooting Stars, take on the senior England women's team in a two-day match at Allan Border Field on 12 and 13 February.

The Commonwealth Bank Shooting Stars side will be announced on Tuesday 21 January.

The England team is in Brisbane to prepare for its two-Test Ashes series against the Australian women's team, the Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars in February.

The first Test is scheduled for the Gabba (15-18 February) with the second Test to be played at Sydney's Bankstown Oval (22-25 February).

New South Wales strengthened its grip on the Betty Wilson Shield in 2001-02, after defeating Victoria in the final by 98 runs at Caulfield Park.

In its 13th consecutive victory, the state also stretched its series win to seven since the competition was renamed in 1996-97 as the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female.

The win was set up by solid batting performances from New South Wales captain Alex Blackwell (43 not out) and Leah Poulton (39) who helped the side reach a total of 9-167.

Medium-pacer Julie Hunter (3-26) and Kelly Williamson (2-20) were the pick of the Victorian bowlers.

Blackwell showed her versatility taking 2-7 with the ball, and combining with Charlotte Anneveld (3-14). The Victorians were restricted to 69 and New South Wales claimed the title.

Australian Capital Territory captain and Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars targeted youth squad member Kris Britt was named Player of the Series. Britt was the leading run-scorer in the championship with 315 runs at an average of 52.50. She also took 14 wickets to finish as the second highest wicket-taker of the tournament along with Tasmania's Veronica Pyke. The bowling duo finished one wicket behind competition leader Renee Chappell (15) from Western Australia.

Chappell also finished as Western Australia's leading run-scorer for the championship (104) while team mate Zoe Kissano took out the wicket-keeping award for her efforts behind the stumps (one catch and four stumpings).

Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars targeted youth squad member and Queensland captain Belinda Matheson was the northern state's leading run-scorer (220) while Leteysha Randall topped Queensland's wicket-takers tally with 12 victims, the competition's third highest.

South Australian captain and Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars targeted youth squad member Lauren Ebsary led her state's run-scoring list (117) while she shared the wicket-taking honours with medium-pacer Emma Sampson, both snaring 10 wickets for South Australia.

### The Betty Wilson Shield

The Betty Wilson Shield is named in honour of one of Australia's greatest female players. Wilson, a right-hand batter and right-arm bowler, played 11 Tests for Australia between 1947 and 1958.

Born in 1921 in Melbourne, Wilson became the 25th female player to represent Australia when she made her Test debut against New Zealand at Wellington in 1947-48. Wilson has scored the highest number of Test runs in Australian women's cricket (862) – a mark that has stood for more than 40 years but could be surpassed this year by current Australian captain Belinda Clark.

Wilson's achievements during her career are well documented. She was the first Australian player - male or female - to score a Test double of 100 runs and 10 wickets in the same match. She also claimed the first hat trick in a women's Test match and in 1985, became the first women's cricketer inducted into the Australian Sporting Hall of Fame.

The Australian Under-19 Championship – Female has existed in its own right since 1996-97. A review of women's cricket competitions in 1995-96 resulted in a number of changes across the board in the women's game. Some of these included the:

- formation of the national league (now Women's National Cricket League);
- restructure of the under-21 competition to become the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female; and
- reorganising of the under-18 competition to become the Australian Under-17 Championship – Female.

These changes brought women's underage cricket competitions in line with the successful men's structure, and created more opportunities for female cricketers to progress through the development age groups on a clear pathway to the elite level.

Since the inception of the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female in 1996-97, New South Wales has won all six titles.

Twenty-two players from the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female (including the former under-18 competition) have gone on to represent Australia in international cricket.

This season's Australian Under-19 Championship – Female showcases some of the nation's best young female cricketers.

In competing in this national event, the players have taken a step along the Australian cricket pathway. Their next steps will lead them to senior grade cricket representation, state cricket and possibly Australian selection.

This pathway is essential in guiding Australia's next generation of talented cricketers to the top, where they will hopefully help the nation maintain its status as one of the world's best cricket countries.

The Australian Cricket Board's (ACB) Game Development department looks after the Australian cricket pathway. The department is responsible for overseeing cricket development activity from the game's grassroots for male and female participants.

Over the past 12 months, ACB Game Development has made significant inroads into harnessing mass interest and talent across the country.

The department has four key units:

- Community Cricket;
- Education and Training;
- High Performance Cricket; and
- Women's Cricket.

Together, these units form a national cricket system that attempts to uphold the spirit of cricket, increase participation, and coordinate world-leading elite performance programs.

### High Performance Cricket

The Australian Under-19 Championship – Female falls under the High Performance Cricket unit, as does the Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy, national second XI competitions and all underage championships for male and female cricketers.

### ACB Centre of Excellence

High Performance Cricket's most significant current undertaking is the establishment of an ACB Centre of Excellence. Over the next three years, the ACB will develop a multi-faceted cricket institution that will build on the unrivalled success of the Commonwealth Bank Cricket Academy.

The Centre of Excellence will see a base established not just for players, but for coaches, umpires, curators and administrators. The ACB's sophisticated sports science and medicine programs will also be incorporated in the Centre of Excellence, along with an information resource centre that will compile cricket intelligence in one location.

The ACB has not yet committed to a location for the Centre of Excellence. Submissions from proponents are being considered, with a decision on the location expected in mid-2003.

## Cricket development in Australia's capital

Cricket development does not just take place in a national capacity. Tireless work is carried out at local levels by state/territory cricket associations.

The Australian Capital Territory Cricket Association (ACTCA) plays a significant role as the chief provider of quality cricket programs in the ACT and regional Southern New South Wales.

In recent times, the ACTCA has established a number of objectives geared toward increasing cricket participation and raising the standard of programs offered to promising players.

In attempting to reach these objectives, initiatives have been established in areas such as coach education and competition structure. A number of

programs for young males and females, as well as Indigenous communities have also been established.

The success of the ACTCA development system has seen a number of talented cricketers rise through the ranks, such as talented all-rounder and Commonwealth Bank Southern Stars targeted youth squad member Kris Britt.



Playing conditions for the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female are contained in the 2002-03 ACB Playing Conditions handbook. Some of the information contained in the Playing Conditions is outlined below.

## Eligibility to play

No person shall participate who is not a current financial member of an association affiliated with the ACB, unless part of an overseas invitational team.

No participating state may include in its squad more than two players who fail to meet one of the following requirements:

- be Australian born;
- be an Australian citizen; or
- have lived continuously in Australia for not less than six months immediately prior to the commencement of the competition.

All participants must be under 19-years-of-age at 1 September 2002. Teams from the Australian Capital Territory and Tasmania can include players who are under 20-years-of-age as at 1 September 2002 to assist with their development.

A minimum age of 15 is required to participate in the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female.

## Format

Eight teams will compete in the championship, separated into two pools: A and B. These have been determined by the previous season's final placings. The ACB has accepted an extra team into the championship to remove the bye.

For the 2002-03 Australian Under-19 Championship – Female, the ACB Invitational team is the England Under-19 side.

The ACB Invitational team is not eligible to win the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female. After the semi-final rounds, if the ACB Invitational side finish in the top two they will not play off for those positions in the final. The team that played the ACB Invitational side in the semi-final would replace the ACB Invitational side, with the ACB Invitational side to play for the third or fourth placing. This ensures the final is played between two state or territory associations.

## Duration of matches and composition of team

All round matches commence at 10.00am. One-day 50 over matches will be played.

A team shall consist of 12 players. Eleven fielders only shall be on the field of play at any one time. One player in each side shall not be permitted to bat.

The Duckworth-Lewis calculation system applies at the championship.

## Umpires

The umpires are appointed by the host association.

## Balls

Four-piece 142g Kookaburra red "Club Match" balls will be used.

## Grounds

Play shall be on turf pitches. Boundaries must be 50 metres.

## Match referee

ACB Senior Officer Women's Cricket Development, Janine Stainer, or a nominated replacement shall act as the Match Referee.

The Match Referee will deal with any extraordinary circumstances and shall adjudicate on any dispute. The Match Referee shall have available a copy of the ACB Under-19 Rules and Playing Conditions which include a copy of the ACB Code of Behaviour, ACB Anti-Doping Policy and regulations, ACB Racial and Religious vilification code and ACB Anti-Harassment policy.

## Squads

A squad may comprise a maximum of 13 players. All members of a squad must be provided by their state or territory association with a copy of the ACB Code of Behaviour, ACB Drug Policy and regulations, ACB Racial and Religious Vilification Code and ACB Anti Harassment Policy, and must be familiar with the contents and abide by these policies.

Players and officials participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female must comply in all respects with the ACB Code of Behaviour, the ACB Racial and Religious Vilification Code, the ACB Anti-Doping Policy and the ACB Anti-Harassment policy

Copies of these documents are made available to players and officials participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female, prior to the commencement of the event. Any player or official who has not been provided with a copy should contact the ACB. While the ACB tries to ensure that copies are available to all relevant persons, it is the individual responsibility of players and officials to ensure that they have read and fully understand the contents of the codes and policies. If these policies are contravened, players and officials may be subject to stringent penalties, including fines and suspension.

## A brief description of each document is set out below.

### 1. ACB Code of Behaviour

Cricket is a game that owes much of its unique appeal to the fact that it is played not only within its Laws, but also within the spirit of the game. Any action seen as abusing this spirit causes injury to the game itself.

Embracing the spirit of the game means participating, either as a player or as an official, fairly and exhibiting respect for other players and officials and the game's traditional values such as graciousness in defeat and humility in victory.

Cricket has a distinct place in Australian society and history. As an element in Australia's national identity, cricket plays a significant role. This status brings with it particular responsibilities for players and officials to conform to high standards of fair play and personal behaviour on and off the field.

The ACB Code of Behaviour is intended to protect and enshrine such important qualities and standards so that all may continue to enjoy the game of cricket now and in the future.

The ACB Code of Behaviour applies to the following persons:

- players who are employed, engaged or appointed by the ACB or a state association or who are otherwise members of any team selected by or playing under the auspices of the ACB or a state or territory association; and
- officials (including coaches, managers, umpires, doctors and other persons acting in an official capacity in relation to a team) who are employed, engaged or appointed in connection with any team or match played under the auspices of the ACB or a state or territory association.

The Code applies to behaviour both on and off the field of play.

The Code applies to all players and officials participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female.

### 2. ACB Racial & Religious Vilification Code

The purpose of this Code is to:

- recognise the commitment of the ACB and state associations to the elimination of racial and religious vilification of players; and
- establish a framework for handling complaints made by players who believe they have been subjected to racial or religious vilification by another player.

Under the Code, a player who is participating in a match under the auspices of the ACB must not engage in any conduct, act towards or speak to any other player in a manner which offends, insults, humiliates, intimidates, threatens, disparages or vilifies the other player on the basis of that player's race, religion, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin.

The Code applies to all players participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championships – Female.

### 3. ACB Anti-Doping Policy

The ACB condemns the use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices in sport. The use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices is contrary to the ethics of sport and potentially harmful to the health of athletes.

The ACB aims to prevent the use of performance enhancing drugs and doping practices in cricket by:

- imposing effective sanctions on persons who commit doping offences;
- educating and informing persons about drugs in sport issues; and
- supporting the drug testing programs and education initiatives of the Australian Sports Drug Agency (ASDA) and other recognized drug testing authorities.

All players, coaches, managers, umpires, doctors and other persons acting in an official capacity in connection with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female may be subject to investigation and disciplined under this Policy.

### 4. ACB Anti-Harassment Policy

The ACB condemns harassment in any form and is committed to providing a sport environment free of harassment on the basis of race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, family status and/or disability.

The Code applies to all players and officials participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female. Copies of these documents are made available to players and officials participating in or involved with the Australian Under-19 Championship – Female, prior to the commencement of the event.
